## *From the Pastor...*

*But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. <sup>21</sup>For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; <sup>22</sup>for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. <sup>23</sup>But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. <sup>24</sup>Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. <sup>25</sup>For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. <sup>26</sup>The last enemy to be destroyed is death.*

*1 Corinthians 15:20-25*

Throughout the year, but especially in the Easter season we celebrate Jesus' victory over death in the resurrection. Christ being raised means that death which seemed victorious on Good Friday, has been defeated. As the Easter hymn puts it, "the strife is o'er the battle done". As we look out on the world, however, death seems to be winning the day. This fact is not new, but the power of death seems especially strong over the past months. In this country we have surpassed one million deaths from Covid-19, along with many more around the globe. We see the death and destruction of the war in Ukraine. In the past few weeks, we have had at least three more examples of the plague of mass shooting events in our country, a grocery in New York, a church in California, an elementary school in Texas. Of course, there are countless other shootings on a smaller scale everyday across our nation.

That is just the physical death, there are examples of spiritual death as well. In the past days the country's largest protestant denomination released a report on their own sexual abuse crisis. The story is remarkably similar to what we know to have happened in the Roman Catholic Church. The leadership in both churches actively covered up and protected pastors and staff who were credibly accused of abuse, refused to report to law enforcement where applicable, and attacked the credibility of accusers. These actions serve death alongside the acts of war, violence, and disease. These are only some examples; we could always list more.

We know that in Christ's resurrection death has lost the war, but death is winning many battles right now. It is frustrating and discouraging. Proclaiming the hope found in Jesus' victory over death is essential, but at the same time it seems distant and elusive. What can we do? We pray, and we seek to minister to those affected directly by death, yes. However, I also want to challenge you to see death for what it is, the enemy. It is far too easy to become numb to death's power. See it for what it is, the enemy at work in the world. You may feel anger at the state of the world. Anger can be righteous, but more often it is destructive. When anger leads to feelings of hatred, revenge, and a desire to lash out, then death's power is at work. Seek to recognize when death's power is at work and flee from it. Remember that the fruit of the Holy Spirit is "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." If something is stirring up the opposite of those feelings, then you can know that the enemy is at work. Social media and other more traditional media play to our feelings of anger and vulnerability. We tend to engage more when we feel angry or threatened; this is the power of death at work.

Instead, take those feelings of vulnerability and anger and reclaim an often-neglected Biblical tradition, lament. The Bible, especially the Psalms, is full of prayers of lament directed to God. Remember there is an entire book of the Bible called *Lamentations*. This is what we are to do with our feelings of fear, anger, and frustration, direct them to God.



# Retirement...



**Highlights for the Council Meeting of April 26, 2022:**1) **Sexton:**

Teknaclean has submitted a bid to clean for \$85/week. This cost is already covered with budgeted funds.

The same group cleans at Calvary and has been known to do good work there.

Advantages: they are insured, church would no longer be responsible for insurance or workman's comp.

Also, the church would no longer need to maintain the cleaning supplies.

Norm Hoffman and Jim Barr are willing to perform Sexton duties for Social Hall and weddings/funerals in the church.

There was discussion about cleaning unused rooms and quarterly/yearly functions. These issues can be negotiated at a later date or handled by the church.

Cleaning lady that Bob Gabel knows would need to be hired as the Sexton.

Church would be responsible for insurance and workman's comp since Sexton would be an employee.

A motion was made to use Teknaclean, pending Proof of Insurance, by Bob Heydt and seconded by Bob Borneman. Motion passed.

2) **Auction in Social Hall:** Concerns about using the property for someone's profit was discussed, also the implications of insurance coverage and the capability of the septic system. A motion was made by Nancy Fioriglio and seconded by Marvin Steward to deny the use of the Social Hall for an auction. Motion passed.3) **Social Hall rented by outside group (Bally Senior Center) May 14- sexton needed:** There are members of the church attending this luncheon and meeting. A Sexton fee will be charged in addition to the member fee for the Social Hall. A motion was made by Marvin Steward and seconded by Bob Borneman. Motion passed.4) **Church facility usage Memorial Service for a nonmember and possible luncheon – May 21:** Memorial Service - \$225 for a nonmember, luncheon (use of Social Hall) - \$200 for nonmember, Sexton fee - \$50. Memorial Service would be limited to the Sanctuary (parlor will not be rearranged) due to Saturday usage and Sunday church service. A motion was made by Nancy Fioriglio and seconded by Bob Heydt to approve this use depending on the availability of a Sexton to be present during service and cleaning afterward.5) **Policy of using Church facilities:** This was added to agenda due to questions about use of facilities, septic etc. Property to address pumping of septic, when was it last done? Policy for the use of the facilities will be provided to all members before the next meeting. Table issue until more information is presented.6) **COVID Protocols:** Remain normal.7) **WIFI Extender:** Extender is installed. Solid coverage in front of church, Parlor coverage is good, back of the church is not as good. Discussion of better equipment can now be addressed by the committee.8) **Defibrillator:** Now that we are back to normal (COVID wise), Nancy Fioriglio will look into classes.9) **Church credit card:** Depending upon the credit card company and request for collateral, a credit card can be obtained with just the EIN for the Church. The treasurer is willing to have name on CC as long as her SSN is not required.

How does the musician read the rest? See him beat the time with unvarying count, and catch up the next note true and steady, as if no breaking place had come between.

Not without design does God write the music of our lives. But be it ours to learn the tune, and not be dismayed at the "rests."

They are not to be slurred over nor to be omitted, nor to destroy the melody, nor to change the keynote. If we look up, God Himself will beat the time for us. With the eye on Him, we shall strike the next note full and clear.
